telecom Namibia, the provider for our telephone and internet service, has been encountering some significant outages. We can only hope they are in the process of upgrading their systems. The most recently outage brought a halt to all electronic communications (no e-mail, Magic Jack or Skype) and electronic commerce (banks would not cash checks because they could not connect to the financial systems to verify bank accounts, no ATMs worked, no credit card transactions, etc.) in the area for 1 day and continued to interrupt service for several days.

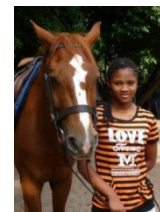
